Description	Intensive study of and practice in writing processes, from invention and researching to drafting, revising, and editing, both individually and collaboratively. Emphasis on effective rhetorical choices, including audience, purpose, arrangement, and style. Focus on writing the academic essay as a vehicle for learning, communicating, and critical analysis.

All essays will be submitted through Blackboard's Safe Assign link and a hard copy will also be submitted at the end of class. Plagiarism will result in a ZERO on the assignment the first offense. If there is a second offense, the student will FAIL the course. In Class Students: Students will be asked to leave the classroom immediately if caught texting/using a phone or smart watch while working on ANY class assignment. If caught twice, they will not be allowed to return. Phones should be placed on the upper left desk corner during class. Brief glancing is acceptable; reading the screen is not. No late work.
